# **Foster Care & Adoption**

We collaborate with adoption placing agencies to provide a variety of adoption related services for those seeking to adopt internationally, privately and from the foster care system.

# **Kinship Support Services**


At AzCA, our goal is to have all kids grow up in a safe and loving family. Families who are raising their relative's children are given the necessary support and assistance that will allow them to navigate the unique challenges that they may encounter while raising their relative children.



100 new kinship caregivers

caring for **107 relative children** were provided information, resources, referrals and support.





## **Young Adult Services**

Our Successful Transition to Adulthood contract allows us to provide opportunities for youth currently experiencing foster care to develop and enhance their skills in areas of resilience, knowledge of adolescent brain development, social connections, concrete support in times of need, and cognitive and social-emotional competency. Youth receive support and resources to increase their ability to live successfully outside of the foster care system.

## **Family Education & Support Services**

Our programs incorporate best practice and/or evidence-based opportunities for parents and children to learn and grow together. We offer all parents and caregivers information and support through various tools and trainings to increase their knowledge of child development and age appropriate behaviors, positive parenting skills and strategies, and the opportunity to build a network of parenting support.

2,575 home visits were made through our Parents as Teachers program.

# **Behavioral Health & Trauma/Crisis Response**

At AzCA, we believe all services and support should be delivered in a trauma-informed, culturally and linguistically responsive manner. By embracing the family, changing circumstances and building relationships, our programs are able to assist families and individuals in crisis by working with them to develop long-term solutions and realistic strategies to reduce conflict, build resiliency, and work toward a positive future.

# **Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics**

In many situations, children who exhibit unhealthy and difficult behaviors (acting out, aggression, self-harm, sleep disturbances, and struggles with regulating emotions), have brain development challenges that can be addressed with proper intervention. This program provides the structure to best recognize experiences that have impacted a child's developing brain. The goal of the Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics is to provide an assessment of the child, determine primary problems, identify key strengths, and apply interventions in a way that will help family, educators, and therapists to best meet the needs of the child.





# Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program

AzCA's Family Education & Support Services department was selected for a multi-year federal grant through the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program. Funding allowed us to implement our proven Parents as Teachers model in the Maryvale Village community of Phoenix.

Our Parents as Teachers program is an internationally recognized, best practice, strengths- and evidence-based parenting education and support program. Parents as Teachers is a home visitation program designed to help new and experienced parents from pregnancy until their child enters kindergarten.

A key element to AzCA's mission is to provide comprehensive, evidence-based home visitation services in an effort to provide families information, education and support on parenting. In-home visits are tailored to individual families' needs to help their children develop optimally during the crucial early years of life. Its goal is to assist caregivers and parents to gain new knowledge and skills to enhance capacity and confidence in their ability to support a child's safety, health, intellect, and well-being. We respond to the ever-changing needs of communities in order for participants to gain new skills, recognize warning signs associated with both typical and/or long-term stressors, and gain a better understanding of child development.

## Coreservices:

- **Personalized Home Visits** Our Parent Educators provide age-appropriate child development information, support a safe and healthy environment, establish and assess measurable goals, and facilitate interaction between parents and children as a positive parenting teaching tool.
- **Group Connections** We provide opportunities for families to connect with other parents, gain support, share information, and allow children to interact and socialize with their peers.
- **Screenings** We screen for early identification of developmental delays, health, vision and hearing problems. These screenings also include Family Strengths Assessments and Goal Planning.
- **Networking** Our Parent Educators help families identify and connect with needed resources to ensure that families receive comprehensive services.



## Primary Goals:

- Increase parent knowledge of early childhood development and improve parent practices
- Provide early detection of developmental delays and health issues
- Prevent child abuse and neglect
- Increase children's school readiness and school success



Enrollments increased 114% in 3 months!

100% of families reported their child received timely developmental screenings.



In Arizona, there are more than

160,000

children living in homes headed by grandparents or other relatives. Our programs help support these extraordinary families and their potential to provide a positive alternative to traditional foster care.





# U.S. Department of Heath & Human Services: Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse

AzCA's Kinship Navigation Program (KNP) Model was recently approved by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services' Prevention Services Clearinghouse as a "supported" practice. AzCA's KNP Model is currently the only program achieving this level in the nation and it is also the highest rating of any kinship program in the nation. The KNP Model is approved for use with both formal (DCS/state child welfare agency involved) kinship families and for informal (not involved with DCS/state child welfare agency) families. States and agencies across the country are now able to partner with AzCA to utilize this supported best practice.

The Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse was established by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to conduct an objective and transparent review of research on programs and services intended to provide enhanced support to children and families and prevent foster care placements.

Our KNP Model provides assistance to families who are raising their relative's children (i.e., grandparents, great-grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, siblings and non-relatives/fictive kin) by helping them to navigate the various systems and effectively utilize available community resources.

Research indicates that children in kinship care experience greater stability than those in traditional foster care. Kinship caregivers provide love and support in a familiar setting, allowing children to remain connected with their families and communities. They are also able to live with people they know and trust, thereby reinforcing their sense of cultural identity and well-being.

## Core Services:

- Information and resource referrals
- Advanced education related to kinship care
- Assistance with completing guardianship packets to help caregivers register children for school and apply for medical services
- Legal resource information
- Assistance for families wishing to become guardians or adoptive parents through the juvenile court
- Support groups
- Help in completing benefit applications such as TANF, AHCCCS and Kids Care
- Advocacy for caregivers and children in school, court systems, health care and mental health agencies, benefits programs, DCS, etc.
